### PROJECTS

#### The League of Women Voters of Delaware: FOI Audit, 2009

The LWVDE has been awarded one of seventeen competitive grants by the LWVUS to conduct a Freedom of Information Audit of public records in Delaware. The purpose of the grant is to assess the compliance record of state and local agencies to citizen's requests for public records.

For this FOI-Audit to be successful, it's urgent that we develop a core of volunteers who are willing to spend the time and energy to conduct this project. The plan is to visit a variety of state and local public agencies and formally request specific public records and to record the agency's responses to the requests. The collective data from this exercise will provide a profile of Delaware's compliance with the State's Freedom of Information laws.

The FOI-Audit visits will consist of four steps: 1) a visit to a pre-selected local, county or state office with an oral and written request for specific public records, 2) a possible phone call follow-up to the agency, 3) a follow-up return visit to access the records and possibly obtain copies of these records, and 4) completing a reporting form. On some occasions, a second visit to the agency may be required to pick up the records.

Auditors will be provided with: 1) an Audit Manual, 2) clear instructions of which public records to be requested, 3) a list

of the public offices to be visited, addresses and phone numbers, 4) Audit Reporting forms, and 5) the names and phone numbers of Audit Advisors who will be available to answer unanticipated situations.

An Audit training session will be held 2 p.m. May 7, prior to the pre-convention meeting at Noble Eagle. During this session, questions will be answered concerning how to make the request, what to do if you are rebuffed, directed somewhere else for the records, charged excessively for copies, or any other questions you have. A scripted request introduction will be provided. We'll even have simulated audit visits.

This FOI-Audit is a unique opportunity for League members (and any other civic minded folks you know) to participate in what is truly a "people's exercise" in promoting open-government.

## ***A TIP FROM PAT***

**How to Download a Bill from the Delaware Website.** Go to [www.delaware.gov/](http://www.delaware.gov/). At the very top of the page, click on **General Assembly**; on the next screen, click on **Bill Tracking** in the left column. Type in the number of the bill, ex., Senate Bill 59, the Building Code Bill. Hit search. The next screen will give you a summary of the bill, sponsors, where the bill is at the present time, and you can click either **Legis.html** or **Legis.Doc** to bring up the bill. You want to click on **Legis.Doc** because when you print out the bill, it has the line numbers on the left side, which is very helpful. Clicking **Legis.doc** brings up the bill; then you may print out the bill.

## ***STORYBANK STORY***

*by Peggy Swygert*

Growing up in the segregated southwest, my life seemed happy, secure and full of love. I was overprotected and shielded from the outside world until my teenage years. My community was large, self-sufficient, and urban, with 55 percent of families owning their own homes. The military was integrated long before some of the states where the military bases were located. This was the beginning of a new American, and we had to learn the "white" National Anthem. However, the practice today at designated programs, etc., is to sing the country's National Anthem followed by the African-American Anthem.

After graduating from the local high school, I was eager to attend the college where some of my family had attended and some were on the faculty. I heard about a group on campus

called the Methodist Student Movement. Students from both local colleges and white students from the university all joined together to be change agents. Integration did not have to stop with President Truman; collectively, we saw our role as pushing for change -- no more separate-but-equal, but one country, one voice, one people. Pushing for integration by joining hands, picketing, peaceful demonstration, and boycotting were all in the action plans.

I married an Air Force man while in college and continued my education. We usually lived on or near the military bases, but found that everyone did not totally accept integration immediately. Acts of violence, bigotry and biased treatment continued and continues today, although not as boldly.

I became a first in several employment positions, saw changes in the housing patterns, employment, socialization and education. In order to keep the momentum going, I wanted to actively participate in diverse organizations that could influence public policy and practices through different forms of advocacy.

I learned about the League of Women Voters from Ruth Johnson, a member of the unit in Kent County, Delaware. I met her on a bus trip to Washington, demonstrating and cele-

brating the Year of the Child. I had always thought that this organization was for white middle- and upper-class women only. Since I learned near Ruth, she would drop literature by my house and suggest that I might find the information interesting.

When I retired and had more time, I decided to explore this organization, and I joined. It has been a learning process, to share ideas and insights and discuss policies with others and learn more about current topics of interest.

### EQUAL PAY DAY

This year Equal Pay Day is April 28, 2009.

On that day a resolution in the House of the Delaware Legislature will recognize AAUW and Equal Pay Day. Please plan to visit the legislature with AAUW on April 28th.

Allow enough time to park, clear security with your photo ID, and join us in the cafeteria of the Legislature Hall at 1:45 p.m. (Convenient parking is available in front of the Archives Building). There will be an AAUW member to meet you by the guards. If possible, please wear green.

AAUW strongly supports equal pay for equal work. To match men's earnings for 2008, women have to work from January 2008 to April 2009 – an extra four months. In recognition of this inequity, we chose this day to come here to our state legislature. **We are the faces of pay equity today – and we have many others across the state.**

According to new data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, in 2007 the ratio of women's to men's median annual earnings reached almost 78 cents on the dollar for full-time year-round work, up from just under 77 cents in 2006. This is the narrowest the wage gap has ever been, but it is only an additional one cent on the dollar. One cent is chump change. It isn't real change.


