The people of Latin America have become increasingly alienated from the United States. This has resulted in the ouster of governments closely allied with U.S. policies and their replacement through democratic elections with leaders critical of the U.S. regional economic agenda, e.g., in Venezuela, Bolivia, Ecuador, and most recently, Paraguay. About 40% of Latin Americans still live in poverty, and no other region in the world suffers greater inequalities of income and wealth.

U.S. corporate investment has done little to change this scenario. This month's discussion will look into conditions affecting economic growth and political change in Latin America and the options for U.S. policy.

We are truly grateful to Lorraine for her many contributions to League and for her friendship. We cherish her memory and the example of community service she set for all of us.

## Reports

### Annual Dues Update

Dues for the current fiscal year---July 1, 2008 - June 30, 2009---were payable July 1 and due by October 1.

If you joined, or rejoined, the League between April 1, 2008 and June 30, 2008, the dues you paid included the current fiscal year.

A small part of your dues goes to LWVDE, to support the work that's done at the state level. Another part goes to LWVUS, to help support the important work that's done by the League in Washington, D.C., and to pay for your *National Voter*.

The majority of the dues you pay supports league programs and activities right here in Kent County, Delaware. Your dues are used to help defray the cost of an occasional speaker, or the rental fee for the venue of one of our monthly meetings, or to help our officers and committee chairs meet some of their expenses. This year, we had significant expenses related to the two recent Candidates Night debates held at Boscov's. These public events sponsored by our League cost us over \$2,200, which is the equivalent of dues received from 49 members paying \$45.00 each, a level we have not yet reached this fiscal year.

We hope that you will consider making an additional donation in support of our local league. Your donation can be included in your dues check. However, if you'd like your additional donation to be tax deductible, please make your donation check payable to LWV Kent County Ed. Fund. Our thanks to those members who have already made a donation in support of our programs.

### Observer Corps

Maintaining an active Observer Corps is an important part of the belief that government exists for our benefit and is accountable to us, its citizens. The League's role of monitoring public meetings is its way of holding officials accountable. Its secondary role is to monitor meetings for instances when officials consider policy issues on which the League has an official position, such as: 1) equity and adequacy in educational funding, 2) preserving electoral integrity and 3) compliance with the Freedom of Information laws.

On Oct 13 the LWV-Kent Co had its Observer Corps Training Session at the Chair's home. Thirteen League members who had indicated an interest in observing public meetings were invited. Three members attended.

Attendees were very interested, asked good questions, and were enthusiastic to get started. ### LWVKC CANDIDATES NIGHTS 2008

The League of Women Voters of Kent County together with the American Association of University Women (AAUW), Dover Chapter, and Boscov's Department Store cosponsored two candidates'night debates on October 15 and 22, 2008.

On the first Wednesday evening, participation of candidates representing 29<sup>th</sup>, 31<sup>st</sup>, 32<sup>nd</sup> and 33<sup>rd</sup>

representative districts as well as Kent County Comptroller engaged in lively exchanges. On October 22, candidates for State Senate, 17<sup>th</sup> district, Insurance Commissioner, and United States Representative participated in the debate. Both events were well attended by the public who raised a wide range of issues, including health care coverage for Delaware's children and health care insurance shortfalls affecting the general population, real estate development in Kent County, jobs, FOIA and other open government concerns, use of renewable resources for statewide energy production, school accountability, misuse of public monies, budget priorities and the Iraq war.

Funding problems and candidate no-shows posed major challenges in organizing this year's debates. Boscov's financial difficulties resulted in a gap in resources to pay for newspaper advertising and the sound system. An aggressive LWVKC effort to attract other commercial and institutional underwriters proved unsuccessful with the exception of a modest donation from AAUW. The League's outlay was just under \$2,200. LWVKC will have to review its fundraising targets and methods if we are to continue to provide this voter service in future years. Candidates who declined the invitation to appear affected their opponents' participation in several races, including 34<sup>th</sup> State Representative district, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Levy Court districts, and Register of Wills on October 15; and 16<sup>th</sup> State Senate district, Lt. Governor, Governor and U.S. Senate on October 22. Media coverage by both the *Delaware State News* and the *Dover Post* was excellent, with comprehensive reports by Drew Volturo and Jeff Brown, respectively.

Our deep gratitude goes to the LWVKC Candidates Night Committee: Beverly Bresnahan and Mary Merritt who contacted all the candidates directly and followed up with them often until just hours before each event; and Joan Breukelman, her husband, Fred, and son, Steve, who handled the computer side of the written correspondence, produced the Candidate Night place cards and formatted the printed programs, which often meant last minute editing due to candidate changes. We also appreciate Betty Wagner's assistance to the moderator and Charlotte Hunt's staffing of the entry table on both nights, as well as the efforts of LWVKC volunteers who facilitated audience participation. We are especially indebted to Ann Alexander, President of AAUW, Dover Chapter, for enthusiastically volunteering her organization's assistance. AAUW

provided a financial contribution and its members helped monitor both events.

A special note of thanks goes to Christina Kalp, Public Relations Director of Boscov's, who handled all the venue arrangements with her indispensable organizational talents. We are also indebted to Rich Mares, Boscov's manager for providing the store's auditorium and agreeing to print the debate programs in house. Finally, we gratefully acknowledge the flawless sound system provided by Mark Fels of Actors' Attic, without which we could not have presented the forum in such a professional manner.


